HINSDALE HISTORICAL SOCIETY CIVIL WAR ENCAMPMENT

Hinsdale, NH - The Hinsdale Historical Society is proud to announce its largest event of the year: a Civil War Encampment to be held this September 13th, 2025 at the historic Colonel Ebenezer Hinsdale House. This immersive living history event will feature reenactors, live music, and a special appearance by "President Abraham Lincoln", portrayed by Steve Wood, with support from the New Hampshire Humanities. This event promises to bring history to life in an engaging and memorable way for attendees of all ages.

Visitors will step back in time as members of The Vermont Civil War Hemlocks - 1st VT Light Artillery return to Hinsdale and will be joined by the Sixth New Hampshire Volunteers, presenting an authentic military camp experience with drills, demonstrations, and educational displays throughout the day.

A highlight of this year's event is a live performance by the 12th New Hampshire Regiment Serenade Band, a Civil War-era brass ensemble dedicated to recreating the music that accompanied soldiers during the war. Their 90-minute concert will include historical narration and rare musical arrangements from the period.

Admission is free and open to the public. Parking will be \$5 per vehicle. There will not be food on-site for visitors. Donations to support the preservation efforts of the Hinsdale Historical Society are always appreciated.

About Steve Wood:

Steve Wood, a graduate of the University of Maine, School of Forestry, worked for nearly thirty years with the UNH Cooperative Extension as an Extension Educator in Forest Resources, retiring at the end of 2003. He has been researching and presenting Living History programs as Abraham Lincoln since 1995. Steve is a member of the Association of Lincoln Presenters, the League for the Advancement of New England Storytelling, and the NH Storytelling Alliance.

About The Vermont Civil War Hemlocks - 1st VT Light Artillery:

The "Old Brigade," of which the 3rd Vt Volunteers was a member, was considered one of the very best of the Union Army. It had the unfortunate distinction of having the highest number of men killed in any Federal brigade. Known as the "Gray Horse Battery," the 1st Vermont Battery served with distinction in the southern theater of the War. These units are who the VT Civil War Hemlocks honor today.

About the Sixth NH Volunteers:

The Sixth New Hampshire Vols. Co.C is a Non Profit civil war reenacting organization representing the men who served in the 6th Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers during the American Civil War of 1861-1865. Our organization was founded in 1988 and has steadily grown into one of the most significant Reenacting organizations in the hobby today. We are based primarily out of Northern NJ, but we have members that range from upstate N.Y. to North Carolina. Today we are the premier Civil War reenacting regiment of the Mid-Atlantic and the ONLY group representing the 6th New Hampshire Vols fully endorsed and recognized to be Authentic reenactors of the 6th New Hampshire regiment by the Family of the regiment's original commander Simon G. Griffin, Brig General 6th reg. N.H.V. We are a progressive unit that strives for Authenticity in our appearance as well as civil war drill and camp life. We are proud members of the United States Volunteers (USV) and we participate in numerous battle reenactments, parades and living history demonstrations in the North East.

About the 12th NH Regiment Serenade Band:

The 12th NH Volunteer Regiment Serenade Band recreates the sights and sounds of mid-19th century America, performing music of the Civil War played on period instruments. The musicians appear in typical Union Army uniform and period dress of the day. The band was formed in 1999 by musicians from New Hampshire who wanted to combine their love of history and music. Since that time, members of the band have been able to find and have restored some rare brass musical instruments dating back to the 1850's, including over-the-shoulder, bell front, and upright saxhorns and keyed brass horns. Concert programs include commentary on the instruments and the many roles bands performed during the war including providing entertainment for the troops, playing for the wounded in hospitals, serenading the officers at night, and providing music for various military functions.

Much of the music the band players is directly from the band books of the 3rd and 4th New Hampshire regiment bands, the Manchester Cornet Band, the 25th Massachusetts regiment, and the most famous Confederate band, the 26th North Carolina Regiment Band.
